#### YOUR COURSE JOURNEY

- Meet with an academic adviser and develop a graduation plan
- Take POLI 101: American Government and POLI 180: Introduction to Global Affairs
- Pre-law students, take POLI 212: Law and Legal Systems
- Pre-law students and those who might be considering law school, speak with the pre-law adviser

- Talk with Political Science professors about career opportunities in the public, private, and non-governmental sectors
- Attend Political Science Career Night
- Look for on-campus jobs through [Quest](#)
- Seek volunteer opportunities through UWSP and/or local non-profit groups
- Create a [college resume and Handshake profile](#)

### MAKING PROGRESS

- If B.A., take foreign language course sequence
- Take POLI 300: Political Inquiry and Analysis and POLI 301: Methods of Policy Analysis
- Pre-law students, take upper-level course on constitutional law, environmental law, or law and society
- Consider a double [major, minor, or certificate](#) to complement your Political Science major

- Connect with faculty members to explore ideas for an independent study project
- Apply for a [Political Science scholarship](#)
- Use LinkedIn Learning or other online learning platform to develop skills and certifications in things like grant and public policy writing
- Practice public speaking in your classes and through experiences like [Model United Nations](#)

- Consider studying a foreign language
- [Studying abroad](#) is highly encouraged
- During an election year, volunteer with a campaign, political party, or get-out-the vote efforts
- Seek leadership opportunities in student organizations and student government

- Ask your Political Science professors about internships
- Pre-law students - meet with the pre-law adviser to discuss law school
- Explore federal government internships in D.C. and abroad
- Use your own networks and connections to conduct an [informational interview](#) or [job shadow](#) with someone in a field of interest

### MAKING PROGRESS

- Take POLI 201: Career Development in Political Science
- Take POLI 315: Minority Group Politics or POLI 360: Gender and Politics in Comparative Perspective
- Take upper-level courses that interest you in both American and Global Politics
- Take upper-level courses that will prepare you for graduate work or law school—speak with your adviser about course selection

- Develop your skills in data analysis, interpretation and professional writing
- Consult with your adviser and other faculty members about the types of knowledge and skills that are needed for graduate or law school
- Develop your leadership skills through involvement in student organizations, internships, and campus jobs like Residential Assistant or Writing Tutor in the TLC

- Study abroad
- Enroll in the [Washington Seminar](#)
- Consider applying for [AmeriCorps](#) or the [Peace Corps](#)
- Join the Political Science Honors Society – [Pi Sigma Alpha](#) (by invitation only to juniors and seniors)

- Review job announcements in political science, public policy, public administration, government, non-profits, and the private sector
- Work as an intern in government, law, or NGO setting
- Attend the [All-Major Career and Internship Fair](#) and/or graduate and law school fairs
- Explore graduate programs and law schools online. Understand testing requirements and application timeline
