A Note from the Co-Director

Eleven Weeks of Nuclear Summer, by Sophie McIntosh, tells the story of young survivors of a vast nuclear attack of unspecified origin. Isolated in the woods of Maine and cut off from any contact with the world outside Camp Aster, the five camp counselors must find in themselves, and in each other, the courage to persevere and survive in the face of the unimaginable. A disaster of such magnitude demands cooperation. But how do you begin to confront a challenge you never imagined? What do you do when the people you need to rely on are not those you would choose to help you survive the un-survivable? What if there's no one else to turn to and nowhere else to go?

Since the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki by the United States in World War II, the natural and human devastation in the aftermath of nuclear disasters has been portrayed in numerous films and television shows. The fallout – literal and metaphoric – has fascinated, terrified, and haunted audiences for nearly eighty years. It is a subject, however, rarely addressed in the theatre. An obvious explanation is that movies and TV have the means to recreate this devastation visually in ways not readily available on stage. But the immediacy of theatre – the physical presence of living, breathing humans in performance – can quickly reveal to an audience what is at the heart of every apocalyptic story: the exploration of human nature. Our capacity for cooperation and for destruction, for altruism and selfishness.

This planet we inhabit and share with other living beings is at a tipping point. In the twin threats of climate change and the unchecked proliferation of weapons of mass destruction around the world, we see the consequences of our action and inaction. Do we have it in us to change course? Can we overcome our differences, real and imagined, consequential and petty, and cooperate in saving our shared existence on this planet not just for ourselves, but for future generations of young people like those portrayed in Eleven Weeks of Nuclear Summer?
